# Message from the Chair

What is now Unison started 50 years ago in 1973, when the Kerby Centre opened in Calgary — located at the former Mount Royal College Campus at 7th Ave. and 11 Street SW in downtown Calgary.

What began as an organization to give seniors a voice has changed and evolved over the years to something bigger and greater. Here and now, with 2023 behind us, Unison, for Generations 50+, is a leader in helping seniors thrive and live beautiful, worthy lives well into the aging process.

Which is why I am so pleased to present this annual report, which details the many incredible events, activities, and accomplishments we undertook in 2023.

One area where Unison has made great strides recently is in reaching out to help our more vulnerable seniors. This includes the Meals on Wheels program in Medicine Hat, and the Thrive Food Security program in Calgary — which rescues surplus food and delivers food to those in need including mobile food markets, bringing food directly to those in need rather than expecting them to come to us.

In addition to expanding our services that deliver directly to those in need, Unison is involved in developing programs to help older adults such as our tax clinics, which help ensure that the less well-off get the governmental benefits to which they are entitled.

In 2023 we were very pleased to receive extra government funding to open all of the beds available at our Unison Elder Abuse Shelter for survivors of abuse. In addition, we have been asked to help other agencies in setting up programs for survivors in smaller communities and rural areas.

We could not continue to offer and develop this wide range of programs and services without the active support of hundreds of volunteers and the many people and organizations who donate funding, time, and services to support Unison.

On behalf of the Board of Directors: we sincerely thank you, and we look forward to your continuing support in the future.

With the worst of the COVID-19 crisis behind us, we took everything we learned from having to adapt to that situation and applied it. Whether it's Meals on Wheels in Medicine Hat, our Elder Abuse Shelter in Calgary, or the bevy of online activities and presentations we offer: we're out there every single day making the lives of our seniors better, letting them know they aren't alone in this world.

There are more challenges to come. 2023 also saw an unprecedented rise in costs, at the grocery store and for our rents and mortgages, and we know that our senior population is disproportionately affected.

We don't know what's to come for 2024, but we can be sure of one thing. Unison, for Generations 50+ is going to be there through the trials, the celebrations, the good times and the bad.

And with our incredible staff, our tireless volunteers, our supportive donors and partner organizations, we're always going to be.

And there's nothing boring about that.

# **Our 2023 Journey**



2023 was an incredible year for Unison, for Generations 50+.

Not only did we continue to establish ourselves as a premiere source of community and assistance for southern Alberta's seniors, our Kerby Centre location celebrated its 50th anniversary!

It was the perfect year to highlight and let folks know all the incredible things we do through Unison. Which is why we were excited to premiere a documentary, created by the incredible Kelly Brothers Productions,

entitled "Belonging: Aging & the Unison Community."

This incredible short film detailed the importance of community, and how Unison kept seniors safe and connected during the horrific COVID-19 crisis. It was a fantastic way to show off all the incredible things we do and it's now available to watch on YouTube!

One of the most important things we do here at Unison, for Generations 50+, is the operation of our Elder Abuse Shelter — the first purpose-built Elder Abuse Shelter in North America.



It was announced in April 2023 that we'd be receiving

a massive increase in funding from the province. We were able to increase our

capacity to serve some of our most vulnerable by huge leaps: hiring more staff and opening more beds.



Our banner year wasn't just isolated to Calgary, however! Over in Medicine Hat, plenty of new and exciting things happened. Veiner's Vintage Transport was launched in August — helping our community members get to where they need to go! — as well as the launch of their Seniors Supports program in May.

Every single year, all of our locations are constantly improving and innovating to ensure our seniors are able to live their best lives: happy, healthy and supported.








# Unison Employees by Generation

In total, our Seniors Supports program in Calgary assisted **6,725 unique seniors** with a total of **20,200 service contacts**.



Unison's FREE Tax Clinic held in Kerby Centre filed **4,361 tax returns** and facilitated a **total refund of \$1,012,652.35** in 2023 for low income seniors.

**95.93% increase** in Benefits & Pensions service contacts (1,235 to 2,421)

**8.11% increase** in tax returns filed (4,034 to 4361)




In total, our Seniors Supports program in Medicine Hat assisted **178 unique seniors** over the span of May to December 2023, with a total of **410 service contacts**.



### Medicine Hat



In the past year, a total of **88 unique Active Aging courses** were offered. On average, there are **45 unique activities weekly and 58 monthly**. For **registered courses, 2,522 individuals attended 242 courses comprising 804 sessions.** Daily and weekly drop-in clubs and classes, which typically attract **5–30 participants per class.** 

Some of the new activities this year include Travel Club, Tai Chi, Learn to Weave on a Frame Loom, and Coulee Creek Outreach Clinic.



With the help of a grant and support from the Alberta Elder Abuse Awareness Council, we implemented our free monthly "Seniors Safety Series: Aging Matters"



The seven topics were selected based on Elder Abuse Program trends, shifting from intervention to prevention.
