And beyond an exciting first: a sold-out, all-inclusive cruise to the Mediterranean and Adriatic in May 2026, made possible by the dedication of our Unison Travel volunteers.

What ties all of this together is a clear commitment to helping seniors live their best lives. That benchmark can be hard to measure, but easy to feel in growing membership numbers, increased visits to our social media and YouTube pages, and in how full the Kerby Café is on any given day. Especially Wednesdays, when our very own house band, the Kerby Sensations, plays to a room full of happy dancers.

That same energy fills the Unison Veiner Centre in Medicine Hat, where the rooms and Veiner Bistro are consistently packed. It's a testament to the remarkable volunteers who bring Unison's mission to life every day. In 2025, 280 volunteers provided food, social, and community support to seniors across our organization.

Among those dedicated volunteers is our Board of Directors. I'm deeply grateful to our entire team, and especially to Richard, Marianne, and Peter, who will be stepping down from their governance roles this year. Their years of service have shaped this organization in ways that will be felt long after their tenure. The fact that they aren't leaving Unison, only their board seats, tells you everything about the kind of community we've built together: friendly, welcoming, and genuinely grateful for every person who gives their time and energy to this place.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

Every year in April, Unison gets to have its own New Year, and honestly, it's one of my favourite times of the year. We host two of our biggest events, the Annual General Meeting and the annual Seniors' Expo, and it's a fantastic coincidence that both fall during National Volunteer Appreciation Month. It almost feels intentional. The staff and volunteers who make both events happen deserve more credit than we could ever fit on a page.

Prepping for the AGM is a bit like a refresh button for the whole organization. Each department, from Calgary to Medicine Hat, takes stock of our clients, members and volunteers. We look at the funds that have flowed through Unison, and the Board of Directors gets to work charting the course for the year ahead – this past year with a particular focus on steadying the ship through some choppy financial waters.

Unison is accountable to you. As a non-profit, we take transparency very seriously, and everything in this report is an honest picture of where we've been and where we're going. Behind every figure, graph and story are real people who give their time and energy to help seniors live their best lives. We genuinely wouldn't be who we are without them.

The ripple effects of the pandemic are still being felt across the non-profit sector in Canada, and 2024-2025 was a tough year. I won't sugarcoat it. Donations came in lower than we had hoped, and that asked real sacrifices from our staff, including some temporary policy adjustments I'm very glad we've been able to reverse. We came through it together, and that says everything about the people who make Unison what it is.

So, what does 2026 look like? Pretty good, actually. Donations are trending upward, our programs are stronger, and newer initiatives like the Garden Studio and Unison TV have been wonderful additions that have me genuinely excited about what's ahead. We're not just growing – we're thriving. Thank you for being part of the journey!

OUR 2025 JOURNEY

In 2025, Unison received significant community support that made a difference in the lives of our members, participants, volunteers and community. One marker of success is the quantity of individuals who step into volunteer roles in both Calgary and Medicine Hat. The more these programs expand, the more we need volunteer support, and Unison has been very lucky because we never seem to fall short of people who want to give back.

At the Unison Veiner Centre, our Meals on Wheels program received funding from Ham Radio Operator Club, United Way of Medicine Hat, and The Community Foundation of Southeast Alberta. Additionally, the Community Foundation of Southern Alberta also supported the operation of the Community Kitchen for our Senior Support program.

In Calgary, Unison was a recipient of proceeds from the Calgary Co-op Golf Tournament of June 12, 2025. This generous gift supported our Thrive Food Security program. Thanks to a grant from The Community Facilities Enhancement Program (CFEP) and the Kinsmen Club of Calgary, we replaced the floor of the Kerby Café, creating a fresh, bright, new environment.

With support from our community, Unison launched two exciting initiatives in 2025. In Medicine Hat, we introduced Unison Connect, a social prescribing program that offers a holistic approach to healthcare that bridges the gap between medical and social care services. This program promotes health equity for older adults by addressing social needs that affect health and well-being, including access to adequate housing, food, transportation, income and social support. The program helps older adults with limited natural support to thrive. In the first year of operations, we received 184 referrals from healthcare providers and supported 56 with client directed care plans.

In Calgary, we introduced Unison Gardens and the Garden Studio. These enterprises have expanded the capacity of the Kerby Centre's Thrive Food Security programs. We have increased our capacity of supporting seniors who live with food insecurity by giving them access to fresh produce, and the process of growing food. In 2025, 603 individuals were supported by Thrive.

We are excited to see how our new initiatives in Calgary and Medicine Hat will grow to enhance community connection and ease some of the cost-of-living concerns that have become a reality for so many seniors. It's thanks to our community that we're able to design new programs to meet the evolving needs of seniors in Southern Alberta.

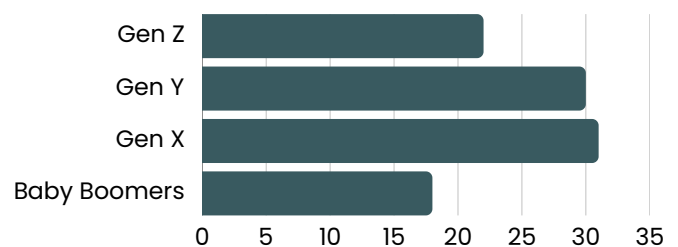
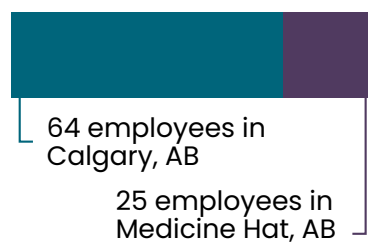

THE UNISON TEAM

Our team is the backbone of Unison. Every day, our staff works with care and commitment to ensure seniors across Southern Alberta can access the programs, services, and supports that strengthen health, wellbeing, and independence. We're grateful for their dedication and the impact they make in our communities.

In 2025, Unison employed a total of 89 staff, with 64 based in Calgary and 25 in Medicine Hat. Hiring remained active throughout the year, with 39 new hires, including Regular (12), Casual (20), Temporary (4), and Seasonal (3) positions across both locations.

DISTRIBUTION OF EMPLOYEES ACROSS LOCATIONS AND GENERATIONS



Our workforce continues to reflect a strong mix of experience and emerging talent. By generation, employees are distributed across Generation X (31%), Generation Y (30%), Generation Z (22%), and Baby Boomers (18%). Educational backgrounds are similarly diverse, with 41% holding an undergraduate degree, 30% a diploma, 11% post-graduate education, 3% college, and 15% high school.

Over time, staffing levels have remained relatively steady from 2022 to 2025, with Calgary representing the larger share of employees and Medicine Hat showing gradual growth.

SUPPORTING SENIORS: YOUR IMPACT

In 2025, our signature fundraising events and sponsorship partnerships generated strong support for our work.

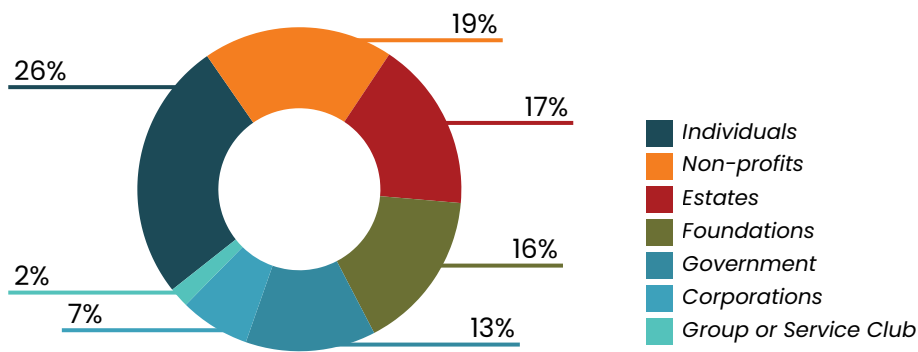
Our Charity Classic Golf Tournament in September 2025 raised \$84,045, bringing together 103 golfers along with 41 guests and volunteers.

The Calgary Seniors' Expo raised over \$77,000 and welcomed more than 1,300 participants, while the inaugural Medicine Hat Seniors' Expo raised \$10,776 with over 250 participants.

We also received \$25,000 through our 2025 Room Sponsors program, with three sponsored rooms thanks to Baytex Energy, Precision Drilling, and United Active Living.

SENIORS SUPPORTS | UNISON AT KERBY CENTRE



Unison’s Seniors Supports department responds to community challenges with practical, person-centred programs that reflect the diverse and evolving needs of Alberta’s seniors. Through tailored, high-impact initiatives, we help seniors access the right supports at the right time so they can live with dignity, connection, and independence.

In the Seniors Services department, 2026 looks to be promising. The free annual tax clinic is offered from Feb 25 – May 1, 2026, with six active stations, accepting in person appointments and drop offs. We also provide tax service at the Dalhousie Community Centre during the tax season to serve clients who live in the NW area along with five Silvera locations under the Home Program Grant.

Seniors Supports also offers a free will clinic, made possible through a partnership with Probono Canada. This program offers support to clients who would like to create their will, personal directive, and power of attorney. A key marker of success for this effort is that we’re fully booked until fall 2026!



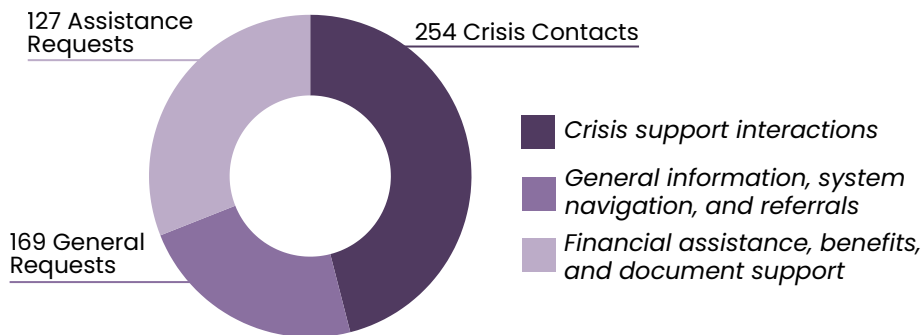
The 2026 Services and Housing Directory connects older adults and those who support them with essential housing options and community services across Southern Alberta.

SENIORS SUPPORTS | UNISON AT VEINER CENTRE

Unison's Senior Supports services provide critical guidance, advocacy, and system navigation for older adults facing complex life challenges, helping them access essential resources and maintain stability. ACTIVE AGING CALGARY UNISON AT KERBY CENTRE



Unison's Active Aging Program supports older adults in maintaining health, independence, and quality of life by encouraging physical, social, emotional, and cognitive engagement.

In 2025, we introduced new programs, including flamenco dance, jewelry making, digital skills training, smartphone photography, cricket for seniors, and online memory writing. It's a combination of fun plus skill development that supports community building. We organized larger engagement events in 2025 such as Seniors' Week and Active Aging Week, which included accessible group activities like aqua fit, an escape room challenge, and a flash mob performance, all designed to build confidence, teamwork, and connection.

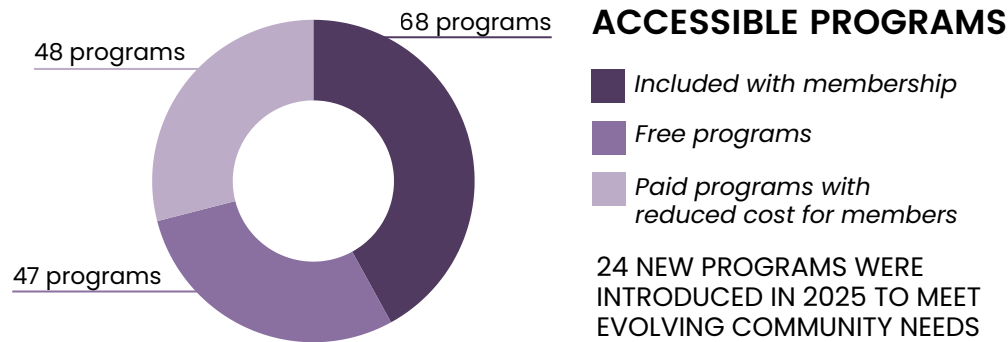


Our collaboration with the Nadia's Hope Foundation allowed us to offer several free programs including the Elliston Park and buffet lunch trip, escape room adventures, aqua fit sessions, and an online sketching workshop. Seniors deeply appreciated these free opportunities, which made participation more accessible and encouraged greater community involvement.

We also offered 23 Unison Travel trips in 2025, including: William Watson Lodge, Bar U Ranch and Nanton, Banff gondola rides and dip in the hot spring, a Medicine Hat overnight trip, and more. In May 2026, we're thrilled for a first of its kinds trip - a cruise to the Mediterranean/Adriatic.

ACTIVE AGING & WELLNESS UNISON AT VEINER CENTRE

Unison at Veiner Centre's Active Aging and Wellness programs empower older adults to stay active, connected, and engaged in their community through education, recreation, and social opportunities.

WELLNESS CONNECTION CENTRE UNISON AT KERBY CENTRE

Unison's Wellness Connection Centre supports the mental, emotional, social, and spiritual wellbeing of older adults through group programs, peer support, and wellness activities. In 2025, we expanded our programming through stronger collaboration with partners aligned with Unison's mission, including Caregivers Alberta, City University, and Mount Royal University.

In 2025, the Wellness Connection Centre strengthened community-based programming through four core initiatives: Coffee and Conversation, Friends Friday, Musical Drum Jam, and Compass for Caregivers. These programs support connection, wellbeing, and healing for seniors and caregivers through evidence-based, community-focused approaches. In 2026, we will continue to grow and adapt these programs to meet the evolving needs of the community.

ADULT DAY PROGRAM UNISON AT KERBY CENTRE

The Unison Adult Day Program (ADP) is tailored to adults 65+ living with health challenges and who require supervision and structured daytime support to remain safe and well at home. The program also provides meaningful respite for caregivers through engaging, therapeutic programming offered Monday to Friday, 9:30 AM to 3:00 PM.

Funded through Assisted Living Alberta (ALA), the ADP is available to eligible participants referred through Home Care Case Managers. Individuals must be active Home Care clients, medically stable, and living with physical health challenges, cognitive changes, or chronic illness.

The program focuses on promoting overall wellness in a safe and supportive environment by offering structured activities that support cognitive and physical health, encourage social connection, and strengthen independence and self-esteem. The ADP also provides health monitoring and daily support, including medication management, toileting, and nutrition, while helping older adults remain in the community with a high quality of life.

ELDER ABUSE SHELTER & OUTREACH UNISON AT KERBY CENTRE

The Unison Elder Abuse Shelter serves seniors through safe accommodation, elder abuse intervention and prevention, community education and case management supports. In 2025, the Shelter focused on stabilizing programming and building community connections through presentations, housing partnerships and student facilitation.

The Shelter achieved two milestones in 2025: The completion of the Unison-BTO Black and Racialized Elder Abuse Awareness Project, and hosting the annual World Elder Abuse Awareness Day event at the Kerby Centre. The Shelter plans on increasing programming in, and outside, of the shelter to address and prevent elder abuse in Southern Alberta.

The Shelter delivered 20 client-centered programs focused on safety, life skills development, recreation, and expanding its Outreach program to create a wider support network for those experiencing elder abuse.

The Shelter Outreach team attended more than 20 events and delivered over 30 presentations with community partners, including Calgary Heritage Housing, Onward Homes, Auburn Heights Retirement Home, Circle of Caring, Calgary Elder Abuse Awareness Collective, Albert Elder Abuse Awareness Council, Goodlinks, Canadian Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse, Healthy Aging Alberta, Alberta Central Credit Unions, Primary Care Networks- Calgary West Central.

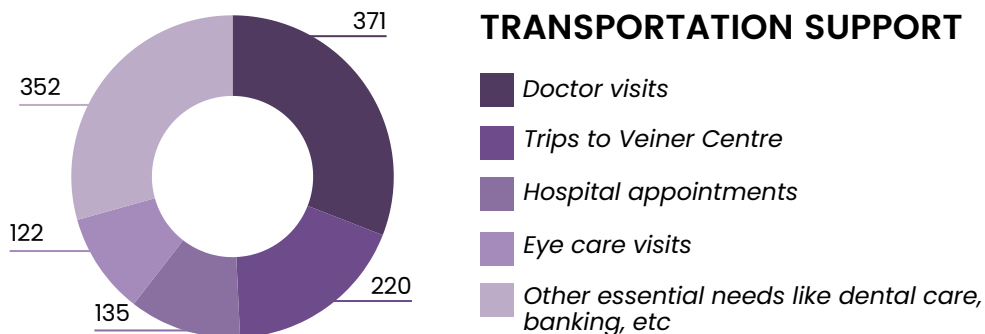

The Elder Abuse Outreach Program at Unison at Veiner Centre provides free, confidential support to individuals aged 50+ experiencing abuse, neglect, or exploitation in Medicine Hat and surrounding areas. In 2025, the program focused on direct client support, safety planning, and community education, including the Senior Safety Series and local presentations. Through advocacy, referrals, and access to safe spaces, the program supported older adults in regaining independence, improving well-being, and connecting with essential community resources.

VEINER VINTAGE TRANSPORT MEDICINE HAT & REDCLIFF



Veiner Vintage Transport removes critical transportation barriers for older adults, ensuring access to medical care, essential services, and community programs. In 2025, we served 196 clients – a massive 366.7% increase from 42 clients in 2023, and the chart below shows the essential needs covered with transportation support.

THE DIFFERENCE UNISON MAKES FOR OLDER ADULTS

“Through a subsidized membership, an individual who had been socially isolated for over a year due to severe anxiety was able to reconnect with community, improving his overall well-being. Previously very social, his anxiety made it difficult to leave his home which negatively affected both his mental and physical health.

Access to the Veiner Centre, particularly the quiet, less crowded fitness centre, provided a comfortable and low-barrier environment where he could increase physical activity at his own pace. This gradual re-engagement supported his mental health, helped rebuild confidence, and contributed to positive steps forward, including returning to school.”

“Seeing these photos from the professional photography fundraiser and knowing that my dad could be part of this year’s Calgary Stampede calendar meant so much to our family. It’s a moment we truly cherish. I also want to express my sincere gratitude for the care and compassion shown to my dad and others living with dementia. The patience, kindness, and dedication of the team make such a difference — helping them feel seen, valued, and included in the community. It takes a special kind of empathy to do this work, and it has not gone unnoticed. We are incredibly thankful.”

“When I came to Seniors Supports, I was homeless and in urgent need of stable housing. I felt overwhelmed and desperate — my health was starting to suffer, and I knew I couldn’t continue living like that, especially at my age.

The team took the time to listen and understand my situation without judgment. They helped me focus on my immediate needs, like shelter, food, and health care, and then guided me through the next steps toward finding stable housing.

With their support, we completed my application for subsidized seniors housing together. They helped gather all the necessary documents and even wrote a statement to explain my situation and advocate for an expedited review.

THRIVE FOOD SECURITY UNISON AT KERBY CENTRE



Unison's Thrive Food Security programs offer a holistic approach to providing food, connection, and resources for older adults in the community.

In October 2025, we introduced the Unison Gardens, expanding our capacity to support seniors with access to fresh produce. Our hydroponic gardens now provide seniors coming to the Unison Market, our senior's food bank, with fresh vegetables and herbs. The Unison Gardens also brought together seniors to help plant, grow, and take care of the gardens, while building community around food. We're grateful to Food Banks Canada and Communities Choosewell for supporting this project.

Supported through FCSS, our Grocery Delivery & Friendly Visits program continued to support homebound seniors in the community with access to groceries, friendly visits with volunteers and referrals to community resources. This initiative aims to reduce social isolation and increase access to food.

In December 2025, we became a Good Food Organization through Right to Food. We anticipate that 2026 will be a time to build on our food security efforts in the community and further integrate the principles of Right to Food in the ways that we support older adults in the community.

In early 2026, we launched the Garden Studio - a plant store with purpose. The Garden Studio generates revenue and community awareness that supports Unison's food security programs.

In March 2026, we are applying for accreditation with Food Banks Canada, which will allow us to be recognized as providing the highest standards for safety and client care.

MEALS ON WHEELS | UNISON AT VEINER CENTRE

Meals on Wheels provides a reliable, nutritious meal delivery service for individuals who are unable to prepare meals on their own. It also offers relief for caregivers by ensuring proper nutrition and ongoing support.

“Following the illness and death of my wife, I felt the need to pay back for all the help I received from so many people. I decided to volunteer for Meals on Wheels as a delivery driver. I discovered that in the process of helping others, I was gaining much more than I was giving. I now look at these people as my personal friends. I have gained so much from my contact with them as well as the other drivers. A whole new world has opened up for me and has given me a new sense of purpose. I miss these special people when I am unable to deliver, and I would encourage anyone with a bit of spare time to join in this program.”

UNISON CONNECT | UNISON AT VEINER CENTRE

In 2025, Unison launched a Social Prescribing initiative, and one year later, we're continuing to strengthen this program thanks to our partnership with Healthy Aging Alberta, and support from the Government of Alberta. Unison Link workers support older adults by connecting them to health services, social programs, and essential resources. This helps reduce isolation, improve overall wellbeing, and enable individuals to remain active, supported, and connected in their community.

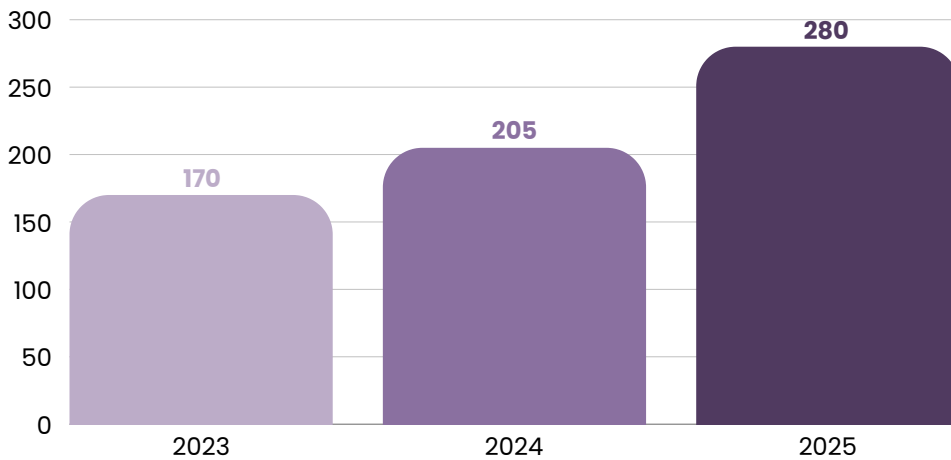
VOLUNTEERS | UNISON AT VEINER CENTRE

In 2025, 280 volunteers contributed 27,253 hours to Unison, equivalent to 15 full-time staff, playing a critical role in supporting programs and services at the Veiner Centre.

Through their work across Meals on Wheels, transportation, reception, and programs, volunteers help reduce isolation and strengthen community connections for seniors. At the same time, 99% of volunteers reported increased well-being, purpose, and a sense of accomplishment through their involvement.

Number of Volunteers

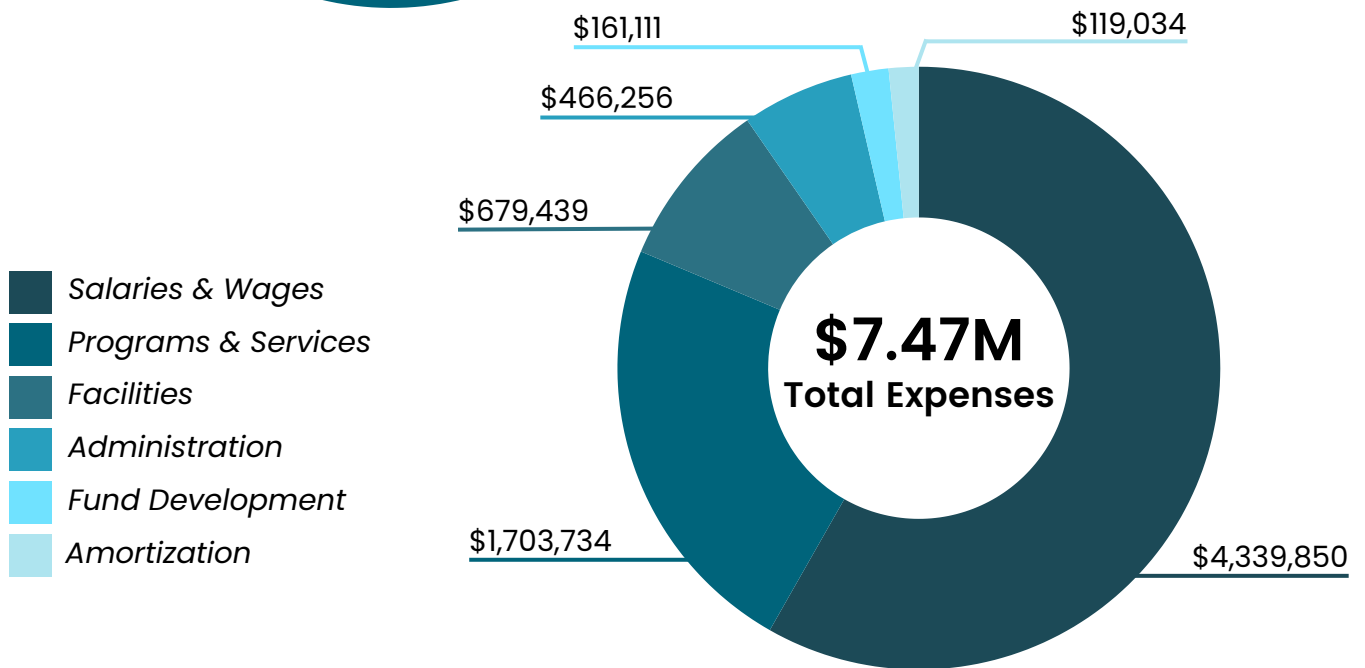
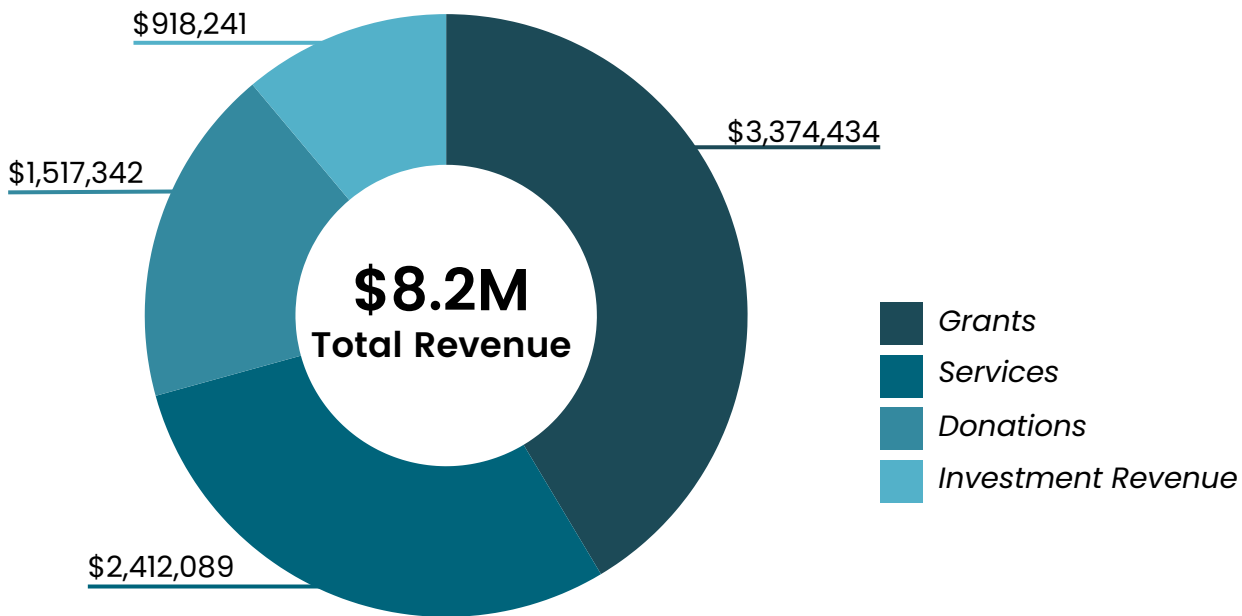
